Next Meeting: August 27. Members Read and Prompt contest

Our August meeting is "Members read" month. Members AND non-members may bring work that they have created and share with the attendees. It may be a work in progress or a completed work. Five minutes will be allotted for each reader. Singers and songwriters within the organization are invited to share their work as a cappella or acoustic numbers; however, there is a limit of one song per performer and the song must also be no longer than five minutes.

August Prompt: "Fireworks Are Annoying": You Choose the Category! Fiction/ Non-fiction / Poetry / Memoirs.

This is a fun competition for members. Non-members may also read their entries, but won't be eligible for the token prize. The prompt MUST APPEAR somewhere within the work, and entries must be no longer than 500 words. The author must be present, but may allow another to read the piece aloud. All entries must be typed and double-spaced. The story must have the word count, category, title, author's name, and date of the competition written at the top of the first page, and a paper copy of the **winner** and

runner-up is to be handed in to the vice-president after the judging. An email to eggchess@gmail.com with the entry will help ensure accuracy. Check your finished work for accuracy, grammar, spelling, and punctuation. You may be the one to be published!

Advice from C.S.Lewis on Writing

TO A SCHOOLGIRL IN AMERICA, who had written (at her teacher's suggestion) to request advice on writing. 14 December 1959

It is very hard to give any general advice about writing. Here's my attempt.

- 1 Turn off the Radio.
- 2 Read all the good books you can, and avoid nearly all magazines.
- 3 Always write (and read) with the ear, not the eye. You should hear every sentence you write as if it was being read aloud or spoken. If it does not sound nice, try again.
- 4 Write about what really interests you, whether it is real things or imaginary things, and nothing else. (Notice this means that if you are interested only in writing you will never be a writer, because you will have nothing to write about ...)
- Take great pains to be clear. Remember that though you start by knowing what you mean, the reader doesn't, and a single ill-chosen word may lead him to a total misunderstanding. In a story it is terribly easy just to forget that you have not told the reader something that he wants to know--the whole picture is so clear in your own mind that you forget that it isn't the same in his.
- 6 When you give up a bit of work don't (unless it is hopelessly bad) throw it away. Put it in a drawer. It may come in useful later. Much of my best work, or what I think my best, is the rewriting of things begun and abandoned years earlier.
- 7 Don't use a typewriter. The noise will destroy your sense of rhythm, which still needs years of training

8 Be sure you know the meaning (or meanings) of every word you use.
